THE PUBLIC PRESENT:

Approximately 8 members of the public were in attendance.

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CALL TO ORDER: Chairwoman Vivian Fleming McGhaney called Sumter County Council's meeting of January 26, 2010, to order.

INVOCATION: Rev. Solomon Jackson, Jr., a visiting minister, gave the invocation.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: All in attendance repeated the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Chairwoman McGhaney stated that she would entertain a motion to approve the January 26, 2010, agenda with any additions, deletions, or as printed.

Prior to taking action on the agenda, the Clerk to Council asked that Council consider amending the agenda as follows:

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Baker, seconded by Vice Chairman Eugene Baten, and unanimously carried by Council to approve the January 26, 2010, agenda as amended.

ACTION ON REGULAR MEETING MINUTES OF JANUARY 12, 2010: Chairwoman McGhaney stated that she would entertain a motion to approve the regular meeting minutes of Sumter County Council held on January 12, 2010.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Vice Chairman Baten, seconded by Councilman Baker, and unanimously carried by Council to approve the regular meeting minutes of January 12, 2010, as presented.

NEW BUSINESS:

(1) Recognition Of Rev. Solomon Jackson, Jr.

The Chairman of Sumter County Council, Vivian Fleming McGhaney, thanked Rev. Solomon Jackson for his philanthropist gift to Morris College, a local four-year private college, in Sumter, South Carolina. Rev. Jackson, Jr. gave the college \$10,000,000 as a gift with several construction projects within the guidelines for spending the funds. Chairman McGhaney stated that she and Council members realize that the \$10,000,000 gift to the College will have residual effects on the economy of Sumter County.

She then presented Rev. Jackson with a silver platter for his gracious and generous donation. Rev. Jackson thanked Council members for recognizing him.

ACTION: No action taken.

Grant Awards -

1. Sumter County Grant Update

Ms. Ginny Yonson, Sumter County Grants Administrator, along with Ms. Evenly Bradford, Sumter County Grants Writer, were present on behalf of the this update. Ms. Yonson stated that copies of the update were provided to Council members (see attached

documents). She also stated that from January 2009 - December 2009; the County applied for approximately \$8,000,000 worth of grants. As of this meeting, the County has received awards of \$3,200,000 worth of grants.

Ms. Yonson also updated Council on pending grants:

- Two from Fire Department - FEMA - denied.
- Second Greenhouse Grant - south Carolina Budget and Control Board - denied. (Ms. Bradford stated that during the grant submission process, many of the agencies applying for the grant had several questions about the grant guidelines and requirements; therefore, the State will re-release this grant and then the County as well as other agencies throughout the State can reapply for the grant under the new set of grant guidelines.)
- Energy Efficient Grants - Still pending; should receive response from the S. C. Department of Energy in March 2010.
- Public Defender -- Department Of Justice and SC Department of Public Service - denied.
- Sheriff - COPS - Personnel - US Department of Justice - Denied
- Sheriff - Gang Prevention Department of Justice - Denied
- Sheriff - Fiber Connectivity - U. S. Department of Justice - Denied

Chairman McGhaney asked about the process for the upcoming CDBG grant funding process. Ms. Yonson stated that the staff does not have any recommendations for the upcoming CDBG funding cycle; she added that the staff is looking to Council for direction.

The Chairman reminded Council members and staff that the Shiloh Water System has had cuts in its grant funding from the staff; therefore, the entire water project has not been completed due to the cut in grant funding. Chairman McGhaney recommended that the County consider completing the Shiloh Water System through the CDBG process.

Ms. Yonson stated that the staff is ready to talk to Council about the project and the CDBG process; Chairman McGhaney asked that the staff consider the Shiloh Water System for the CDBG process.

ACTION: No action taken; received as information.

OTHER PUBLIC HEARINGS -

NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED:

(2) Presentation By Mr. Barney Gadson - HYPE After School Programs.

Mr. Barney Gadson, stated that he is the Director of the HYPE After School Program. He added that HYPE is an acronym for *Helping Youth Prepare For Excellence* - this project began in 2004 at the Marion H. Newton Family Life Center. Since that time, the HYPE program has seven locations, and serve over 500 children daily in the after school program. Each child is not only assisted with homework but the child also receives a hot meal each day. There is a sister program to the HYPE program which is at Lakewood High School called Project High School. The program is free to all participants. It is funded through the South

Carolina Department of Education and Twenty-First Century Community Learning Center Grants.

He added that what the program has ahead of it is School Consolidation. He stated that during this process; it is his hope that the HYPE program or any after school program is not lost in the process as the School Consolidation process continues. He asked for Council to help support the HYPE program by helping ensure that those school board members which are elected in November 2010 will be persons that are supportive of after school programs and that when they hire the School Superintendent, he/she would be a person that is interested and supportive of after school programs.

Mr. Gadson also stated that from conversations that he has had with people around the State is if a School Superintendent is not supportive of after school programs, then the programs will die.

The after school programs are working. He asked Council members to come visit any of the sites that they have in HYPE. One of the main focuses of the program is to make sure that each child has a safe place to be during after school hours. Mr. Gadson also said that it is the hope of HYPE to expand the program next year.

Council members asked what are the names of the different locations:

1. Wedgefield Baptist Church
2. New Bethel Baptist Church
3. Trinity Missionary Baptist Church
4. M. H. Newton Family Life Center - Jehovah Missionary Baptist Church
5. Jehovah Missionary Baptist Church Christian and Academic School
6. North Hope Center
7. South Hope Center

Chairman McGhaney stated that during the summer of 2009, Mayewood Middle School received a Twenty-First Century Grant and she was honored to work in the program too.

ACTION: No action taken; received as information.

(3) A Proposed Resolution Honoring A Former Tuskegee Airman.

The Clerk to Council asked Council members to allow her to prepare a resolution which would honor a former Tuskegee Airman who resides in Sumter County. There will be a reception for the cast and crew and honored guests after the performance of the "Black Eagles" at the Sumter Little Theatre on Thursday, February 4, 2010.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Council Edens, seconded by Councilwoman Sanders, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the development of a resolution and directed the Chairman and the Clerk to execute and deliver the resolution on behalf of the County.

(4) Resolution Authorizing The Chairman To Sign A Joint Resolution With The City Of Sumter In Support of F-35A Aircraft At Shaw Air Force Base.

Retired General Tom Olsen was present on behalf of this proposed resolution. He asked Council to please support this resolution as prepared. General Olsen stated that this resolution will be given to the staff at Shaw AFB who in turn will give the Resolution to U. S. Air Force representatives. The United States Air Force is conducting an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate the potential environmental consequences of establishing operation F-35A aircraft at Shaw AFB. There will be a scoping meeting on Monday, February 1, 2010, at the University of SC, Sumter, Arts and Letters Building, Room 116, 200 Miller Road between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. The public is invited to come see the presentation about the aircraft.

After all comments, Council took action on adoption of the resolution.

WHEREAS, the United States Air Force has announced its intent to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate the potential environmental consequences of establishing operational F-35A aircraft at one or more Air Force and/or National Guard installations across the United States, including Shaw Air Force Base; and

WHEREAS, Sumter County Council wishes to acknowledge its strong support of establishing operational F-35A aircraft at Shaw Air Force Base; and

WHEREAS, Sumter City Council also wishes to acknowledge its support of establishing operational F-35A aircraft at Shaw Air Force Base; and

WHEREAS, Sumter County Council and Sumter City Council would like to issue a Joint Resolution acknowledging their collaborative support of establishing operational F-35A aircraft at Shaw Air Force Base.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the members of Sumter County Council, do hereby authorize the Chairman, Vivian Fleming McGhaney, to sign a Joint Resolution with the Mayor of the City of Sumter, Joseph T. McElveen, Jr., expressing the County of Sumter and the City of Sumter's support of establishing operational F-35A aircraft at Shaw Air Force Base.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Council Edens, seconded by Councilwoman Sanders, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the development of a resolution and directed the Chairman and the Clerk to execute and deliver the resolution on behalf of the County.

(5) A Resolution Supporting Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority (SWRTA) In Its Submission Of 5311 And State Mass Transit Fund Grant Application.

The Clerk to Council presented this proposed resolution to Council to be considered for adoption. As review to the resolution, Council took action on its approval. NOTE: Ann August, the Director of SWRTA, was present on behalf of the resolution.

WHEREAS, the Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority is the public transportation provider in the Santee-Lynches Region and the designated lead agency in a coordinated transportation project sponsored by the South Carolina Department of Transportation/Division of Mass Transit;

WHEREAS, the Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority is authorized to receive funding for capital purposes, operating and administrative purposes as related to state mass transit; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Sumter County Council of the County of Sumter, South Carolina, have jurisdiction over the area in which these services are performed; and

WHEREAS, the said members of County Council recognize the need for service delivery by the Regional Transportation Authority and that transportation is a vital link between education and economic development; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Sumter County Council supports the grant application by Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority for funding of Transportation Services during fiscal year 2010-2011 for 5311 (Rural) and State Mass Transit Funds and all other funds as appropriate.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Edens, seconded by Councilman Blanding, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the resolution as presented and directed the Chairman and the Clerk to execute and deliver the resolution on behalf of the County.

(6) A Request To Prepare A Resolution In Support Of Transportation Options For The State Of South Carolina.

The County Administrator introduced this matter stating that this proposed resolution is presented by the Carolinas Association Of Passenger Trains (CAPT). This organization is a 501©3 non-profit organization chartered in the Palmetto State for the purpose of informing the public of the viability and advantages of a more balanced transportation system including rail and local transit as integral parts. CAPT asked for the County to give serious consideration in adopting a resolution in support of transportation options for the State of South Carolina which would Enhance Rail Passenger Service.

After review of the resolution and supporting documentation, the Chairman called for a vote on adopting the resolution. No motion was offered on this matter.

ACTION: No action was taken on this matter.

(7) **First Reading - 10-701 - An Ordinance Approving A Petition Calling For A Referendum On The Dissolution Of The Wedgefield-Stateburg Rural Community Water District.**

The County Attorney, Mr. Johnathan Bryan presented this proposed ordinance to Council for first reading approval. He stated that attached to the ordinance is a letter from John Duffie (see attached letter) as well as a petition calling for the referendum. A copy of the ordinance, as listed below was given to each Council member. After review of the ordinance and the Attorney's presentation, Council took action on first reading.

WHEREAS, The Wedgefield-Stateburg Rural Community Water District is a special purpose district created by the South Carolina General Assembly by Act #1022 of the Regular Sessions of 1964 and by Act #65 of the Regular Sessions of 1967; and

WHEREAS, The Wedgefield-Stateburg Rural Community Water District is authorized to provide waterworks service within its service area, as such service area was initially established by Act #65 of the Regular Sessions of 1967 and as amended by Sumter County Ordinance 09-697; and

WHEREAS, The Wedgefield-Stateburg Rural Community Water District operates a waterworks system that provides service within its service area; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors of the Wedgefield-Stateburg Rural Community Water District (hereinafter "WSRCWD") has determined that it is in the best interest of the WSRCWD to dissolve in accordance with Article 15, Chapter 11, Title 6 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (2004), entitled "Dissolution of Special Purpose Districts;" and

WHEREAS, The governing statutes require that before a petition may be circulated for consideration by the qualified electors of the district, the entity named in the petition as that which shall assume the assets and liabilities of the district upon dissolution and shall provide the services currently provided by the district, which in this case Sumter County, must be provided with a copy of the proposed petition; and

WHEREAS, Sumter County Council has received a copy of the proposed petition requesting that a Referendum be held. The form of the petition is attached hereto as Attachment A; and

WHEREAS, The governing statutes require that Sumter County adopt an ordinance within one hundred twenty days following receipt of the proposed petition by which Sumter County agrees, should a referendum held pursuant to law be successful, to become responsible for the assets and liabilities of the district and to provide the service or services set forth in the petition upon the dissolution of the district.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SUMTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AT ITS REGULAR MEETING DULY

ASSEMBLED AND BY THE AUTHORITY THEREOF:

1. The recitals set forth above are incorporated herein and made a part of this Ordinance as findings of fact as if set forth verbatim.
2. If the Referendum is held and results in a favorable outcome, the WSRCWD will be dissolved and Sumter County shall then become responsible for the assets and liabilities of the WSRCWD and shall then and thereafter provide the services set forth in the petition.
3. Sumter County is authorized by law to provide the services currently provided by the WSRCWD and Sumter County is authorized to and shall, before the dissolution of the district, issue such obligations as are necessary to fully pay or decrease all outstanding general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, lease-purchase obligations, and other obligations of the district, except to the extent, if any, that the political subdivision is able to lawfully assume the obligations with the consent of the holder thereof.
4. A certified copy of this Ordinance will be forwarded to the Board of Directors of the WSRCWD within five days of its adoption.
5. Signatures affixed to any petition before the adoption of this Ordinance are of no force or effect.
6. Sumter County does not propose to finance the provision of any services now provided by the WSRCWD to the area within the district in whole or in part through the levy and collection of *ad valorem* taxes and does not propose to create a special tax district therefore.
7. The Sumter County Council has examined the form of the Petition and is satisfied, upon due investigation and upon receiving advice of its counsel, that it is in compliance with the governing law in Article 15, Chapter 11, Title 6 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (2004), entitled "Dissolution of Special Purpose Districts."

ACTION: MOTION was made by Council Edens, seconded by Councilwoman Sanders, and unanimously carried by Council to grant first reading to this proposed ordinance as presented.

- (8) First Reading -- 10-702 -- An Ordinance To Amend Sumter County Code Of Ordinances, Chapter 6, Article Ii, Section 6-20 Relating To Dogs And Other Animals.

NOTE: This item was removed from the agenda.

- (9) A Resolution Supporting Unity Day In Sumter County, South Carolina As Sponsored By Salem Missionary Baptist Church.

The Clerk to Council informed Council that a copy of this proposed resolution was placed in Council's folders for review. After perusing the resolution, Council took action on adopting the resolution as presented.

Whereas For the past five years Salem Missionary Baptist Church has expressed its desire to unify the entire Sumter County community by hosting Unity Day on the last weekend in February; and

Whereas The Unity Day concept was established on February 22, 2004 when the Spirit of God placed in the heart of Salem Youth Minister, Reverend James Kennedy, compassion for the joint suffering of all our forefathers; and

Whereas It is the deep conviction of the members of Salem Missionary Baptist Church and its Interim Pastor, Rev. Lei Knight, that community unity is critically important to the growth and survival of the Sumter, South Carolina community; and

Whereas It is the belief of the members of Salem Missionary Baptist Church that the labor of their great forefathers was for unity, and with that belief in mind Salem reached out into the community of Sumter to solicit the support of churches of all denominations, businesses, politicians, civic groups, and other organizations; and

Whereas The Unity Day planners seek, also, to create partnerships among and between people, local governing bodies, schools, law enforcement agencies, churches, denominations, and citizens of all ages, sexes, races, color, orientation, education level, gifts, economic strata and backgrounds through a program of group participants;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that I, Vivian Fleming McGhaney, Chairman of Sumter County Council, do hereby partner with Salem Missionary Baptist Church Unity Day Committee and issue this resolution proclaiming the last Saturday in February as:

in
Sumter County, South Carolina**

And call upon our citizens to join with me in partnering with each other to build Unity in our community.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Blanding, seconded by Councilman Byrd, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the resolution as presented and directed the Chairman and the Clerk to execute and deliver the resolution on behalf of the County.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- (1) Fiscal Tax and Property Committee Meeting Held on Tuesday, January 26, 2010, at 4:00 P.M. In County Council's Conference Room At The County Administration Building - (McGhaney, Blanding, and Edens).

The Chairman of the Committee, Chairman McGhaney gave the following report and recommendations from the Committee meeting.

1. Executive Sessions Items:

Briefing From The County Attorney Concerning Two Lawsuits. The Committee recommended that the County Administrator should proceed with negotiations on a legal matter with the City of Sumter.

ACTION: MOTION and a second were received from the Committee, and unanimously carried by Sumter County Council to direct the County Administrator to proceed with negotiations on a legal matter concerning the City of Sumter.

Contractual Matter Pertaining To Water: The Committee recommended from executive session to allow the County Administrator and staff to conclude the Shiloh Water contractual agreement with the City of Sumter by forwarding a check to the City in the amount of \$85,152 to come from the County's Infrastructure Fund.

ACTION: MOTION and a second were received from the Committee, and carried by Sumter County Council to direct the County Administrator to conclude the Shiloh Water contractual agreement with the City of Sumter by forwarding the a check to the City of Sumter in the amount of \$85,152 and to secure those funds from the County's Infrastructure Fund. Councilwoman Sanders abstained. The motion carried.

- 2. Discussion And Possible Action On Naming Of Field #4 At Patriot Park Sportsplex Baseball Complex.** The Committee received a request asking that Field #4 at Patriot Park Sportsplex Baseball Complex be named in honor of the World Series Winners - Sumter Debs. It was recommended by the Committee that instead of naming one of the fields after the Sumter Debs that an appropriate memorabilia will be placed at the Baseball Complex honoring the Sumter Debs and that Sumter County will also recognize all current, former, and future Regional, State, and World Champions in an appropriate way at the Patriot Park Sportsplex Baseball Complex. The particulars

concerning the appropriate process and procedures for recognitions at the Sportsplex will be shared with Council members at a later time. Additionally, \$1,000 will be secured from the Construction Account funds to provide for the expense of purchasing and installing the appropriate memorabilia for previous, current, and former champions. The same will be true for the Soccer Complex and any other future sports complexes at Patriot Park Sportsplex.

ACTION: MOTION and a second were received from the Committee, and carried by Sumter County Council to secure \$1,000 or more from appropriate Construction Account to create and install the proper memorabilia in recognition of the former, current, and future softball and baseball champions which are sponsored through the Sumter Recreation Department.

3. **SWRTA Transportation For Rural Kids.** No report given; this matter will be placed on the next agenda for Fiscal, Tax, and Property.
4. **Request For Funding From Francis Marion Trail Commission.** The Chairman will write a letter to the Francis Marion Trail Commission requesting funds expressing the County's regrets that Sumter County Council will not be able to honor their request of \$5,000 to \$7,000 to help fund the Commission's efforts.

ACTION: MOTION and a second were received from the Committee, and unanimously carried by Sumter County Council, to approve the recommendation as presented.

5. **Update Concerning The County's Leash Law.** This matter was removed from the agenda.
6. **Update On Sumter Airport Operations.** The County Attorney briefed Council on the positive progress of the Airport Operations.
7. **Discussion And Possible Action On the 2009-2010 Fiscal Year Budget.** This matter was removed from the agenda.
 - Amending The 2009-2010 Fiscal Year Budget Of Sumter County Government.
This matter was postponed until such time that the S. C. General Assembly informs local government about impending cuts that will happen to the budget.
 - Transferring Funds From Different Line Items Within The 2009-2010 Budget.
This matter was postponed until such time that the S. C. General Assembly informs local government about impending cuts that will happen to the budget.
8. **Tour:** Members of Sumter County Council will tour several areas in the County to better visualize the needs as it relates to planning for use of the Building America Bonds. The Tour will be held on Tuesday, February 2, 2010.
9. **Payment Of Invoice:** The Committee recommended engaging Carolina Clear to disseminate the educational component of the Stormwater Utilities Fees at a cost of

\$15,000. The fees will be secured from the County's Infrastructure Fund Account contingent upon reimbursement being made to the Infrastructure Fund Account from the Stormwater Utilities Fees once implementation occurs.

NOTE: Several Council members voiced their concerns about the County being required to fund educating the public on Stormwater Utilities Fees. However, the Administrator informed Council that the education component of this new mandate requires that the public be educated concerning the implementation of this requirement.

ACTION: MOTION and a second were received from the Committee, and unanimously carried by Sumter County Council, to approve the recommendation as presented. Council members Edens and Byrd, ~~and Blanding~~ voted in opposition, the motion carried.

(2) Report From Council Members On Other Meetings, Trainings, and/or Conferences.

Several Council members attended the Chamber Retreat (Larry Blanding, Naomi D. Sanders, Jimmy Byrd). Chairwoman McGhaney was supposed to attend, but due to death in her family, she was unable to attend. She thanked the County Administrator and other staff members for presenting the *Report To The People* presentation.
